Travel from the Airport

Meet & Greet

The University offers a meet and greet service to international students arriving for Semester 1 in September 2024. Their Meet & Greet team will meet you at London Heathrow Airport and will help direct you towards onward public transport and answer your questions.

Public Transport Options

• National Express

There is direct coach travel available from Heathrow Airport to Southampton through <u>National Express</u>. The Journey takes around 2 hours.

• <u>Train</u>

There are rail travel options from Heathrow Airport to Southampton or Winchester station. If you travel by train, there will typically be one or two changes during your journey. While rail travel is generally more expensive than coach travel, you can make savings by booking your ticket in advance on <u>trainline.com</u>.

Opening a Bank Account

Choosing a bank

When selecting and opening a bank account or building society account as an international student in the UK, it is important to take various factors into consideration. We can't offer guidance on the specific account or financial institution you should opt for, but there are several consumer websites in the UK that focus on giving tips regarding the accounts offered by local banks.

Banks will often offer a basic bank account, which is different to a standard 'current account'. It offers limited facilities, is usually fee-free, and allows you to receive money and pay bills but does not allow you to have an overdraft. Money Helper has <u>comprehensive information on the identity</u> <u>requirements needed for basic bank accounts</u>.

Changing your address or other personal details

It is important to let your bank or building society know when you change your address or any other personal details while you are in the UK. Try to keep copies of any correspondence you have with your bank or building society. If you are leaving the UK for a long break, for example for the summer vacation, it is best that you let your bank know in case they treat your account as 'dormant' and close it.



Healthcare

Registering with a local doctor

To access health care in the UK, you need to <u>register with a GP</u> (General Practitioner) when you arrive. Some treatment provided by the UK's National Health Service (NHS) is free for everyone, including a visit to your GP.

If your GP refers you to hospital for treatment, you will usually be given an appointment to see a consultant (specialist doctor). If you think you need to see a specialist, you should approach your GP first and ask them to refer you.

Registering with a local dentist

When you contact a local dentist, you should ask whether they will accept you as an NHS patient. Many dentists in the UK now only accept private patients. Even if you are treated under the NHS there will be a charge, but the cost will be lower than that of a private practice. You can register with a dentist near your accommodation.

When to call 999

The number for life-threatening emergencies in the UK is 999. The accident and emergency department in hospitals (A&E) is for emergencies only, if you are not sure what to do you can call the National Health Service's helpline (111) first or visit your pharmacy. They will be able to advise you.



SIM Cards and Phone Plans

When you arrive in the UK as an international student, it's important to start your mobile phone plan as soon as you can. This will allow you to access essential services (such as emergency numbers) and will help you stay connected with fellow students.


Many essential activities will require a working phone number, such as setting up a bank account, registering healthcare services, or receiving important notifications from local authorities.

Start by researching the different mobile network operators (MNOs) available. These operators offer various plans, including Pay-As-You-Go (PAYG) for flexibility or monthly contracts for fixed rates. Think about your usage patterns, including data needs and whether you'll be making international calls. Comparison sites can help you pick the best plan based on your personal needs. Look out for student discounts and special deals offered by MNOs, and be prepared with the necessary documents like your passport, visa, or proof of address when purchasing a SIM card.

Once you have found a plan, make sure to check the coverage of your chosen network to ensure it's reliable in your area and on campus. If your phone is locked to a Malaysian network, you may need to unlock it to use a UK SIM card.

The Buddy System

Our SUSU Buddy System is an informal peer-to-peer support scheme for new students. The aim of the buddy system is to help you settle into life at University of Southampton by matching you to a volunteer who regularly keeps in touch (online and/or in-person) to check in and find out how you are getting on.



Our Buddy System is the perfect way to connect with another student at the University of Southampton.







How to Apply

To apply for our buddy system, head to the <u>SUSU Buddy System</u> <u>page</u> to check when applications next open. The link to the application form will be open a couple of times throughout the academic year, starting with October 2024. The form will ask you a few questions about your hobbies, interests and preferences.

Give It A Go

<u>Give It A Go</u> is an activity programme provided by SUSU where you can find diverse weekly craft workshops, day trips to near cities, taster sessions by our clubs and societies such as surfing, volunteering and lots of fun things to do!


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The Advice Centre: Housing, Academic Matters and Finance

Fraud and Scams: How to Protect Yourself

Some criminals specifically target international students, using social media, email or phone calls pretending to be from a legitimate organisation (such as the UK Home Office, your university, or UKCISA).

They often demand money, calling it a "fee" or a "fine" for a non-existent problem, and claim that if you do not pay them quickly, there will be damaging consequences (for example ending your studies, deportation or cancelling your visa).

It is important to be aware that organisations such as the university and the Home Office would never contact you under such basis.



As an international student, it is very likely that you will receive scam calls or messages throughout your studies. If you are unsure about a message or email, please make sure you check with the Student Hub or our SUSU Advice Centre. The university also has <u>guidance</u> available on their website about recognising and reporting phishing emails.

If you receive a call and you think it might be a scam:

- Do not give the caller/sender any personal information, and do not confirm that any information they have is correct.
- Do not make any payment.
- Report the incident to the Student Hub or the SUSU Advice Centre

Transportation - Southampton







Breeze App

<u>Breeze</u> helps you find the fastest, cheapest, and eco-friendly ways to get where you want to go in Southampton. It compares all transportation options, saving you from having too many apps. You can also use it to unlock an e-scooter, bike or e-bike in the city, and check bus and train schedules to plan your route.

Uni-link Bus

The University runs the Uni-link bus service. Details of our routes and timetable are available on the Unilink website. Transportation - Southampton

Cycling

The University has a number of secure cycle sheds across Highfield campus for staff and student use. Please note that you will need your student ID activated to use the bike stores. This can be done by visiting the UniLink office on Highfield campus.

Southampton has a good cycle network, though it may be advisable to look into the <u>UK's Highway Code for cyclists</u> so you know how to stay safe. To plan your cycling route in Southampton, you can use the <u>My</u> <u>Journey</u> website.

Travel by train

Southampton has two mainline railway stations – Southampton Central and Southampton Airport Parkway. The average journey time to London Waterloo from Southampton Central is 1 hour 30 minutes. You can travel from campus to both railway stations by Uni-link bus.

<u>National Rail Enquiries</u> is a useful website to help plan your route. Trainline sometimes offers discounted rates for advance ticket purchases.

Travel by coach

Coach travel is often more affordable than train travel in the UK. A coach trip can be a great, inexpensive way to take a holiday or a city break. To find out more about coach travel, visit the <u>National</u> <u>Express website</u>.



Transportation - Winchester

Travel by train (Winchester)

Winchester Train Station is a short 10–15 minute walk away from Winchester School of Art Campus. A train journey from Winchester to Southampton Central station will take you 16 minutes, and London Waterloo is only one hour away.

<u>National Rail Enquiries</u> is a useful website to help plan your route. Trainline sometimes offers discounted rates for advance ticket purchases.

Travel by bus (Winchester)

The Unilink U7 or Bluestar 1 bus services can be a convenient way to travel between Winchester and Southampton, especially if you live near one of the bus stops on the routes. Plan your journey and find out more about fares on the <u>Unilink</u> or <u>Bluestar</u> website.



Cycling (Winchester)

Winchester has a good bike network and beautiful cycling routes, though it may be advisable to look into the <u>UK's Highway Code for cyclists</u> so you know how to stay safe.

Clubs & Societies

With over 300 sports and activities, we can almost guarantee that you will be able to find a group that shares your hobbies and interests!

Studying on campus is just the beginning, and SUSU gives you many opportunities to have fun and get involved with something new. Whether it's competing in a sport you love, giving back to the local community through volunteering or trying something completely new, there's a club or society out there for you!

If you are not sure whether to jump in and join a club or society, you can always contact its committee with questions, attend a taster session or you can follow them on social media to see what they get up to. Our committee members are usually very keen to meet new members and all groups are open to all students, so don't hesitate to reach out to a club or society if there is anything you're unsure of. The Bunfight (Clubs & Societies Fair) during Freshers week is also a great opportunity to meet our committee members in person. Why get involved in our Student Elections?

Standing as a candidate for a represenation role provides you with experience and employability skills. How else can I get involved?

- Voting in our elections is one of the key ways you can make your voice heard by the Union. The student officers and academic reps we work with each year represent all students and inform projects and activities at the Union. If you are not running for a role yourself, you can still be involved by following the elections campaigns and voting for the candidate that you feel best represents you.
- Talking to our officers and reps throughout the year ensures they know about your concerns or ideas about student life at Southampton, and means we can work towards any positive changes students want to implement. Student Discounts

Your Student ID Card

Your student ID will help you save money. Many businesses will ask for student ID as proof before they offer you a student discount, so make sure to bring it with you to save money in various shops, restaurants and other venues.

UniDAYS and Student Beans

Some student discount schemes ask for a fee, but <u>UNiDAYS</u> and <u>Student</u> <u>Beans</u> are completely free and both give you access to a range of online shopping deals.

Railcard

If you plan to regularly travel by train, it is worth investing in a Railcard, which will get you a 33% discount on all rail travel. Head to the <u>Railcard</u> <u>website</u> to find out more.

TooGoodToGo

<u>TooGoodToGo</u> is an app which aims to fight food waste by connecting customers to restaurants, cafes and stores that have unsold food surplus. Here, you might find full meals, coffee, or pastries left over from the day at a cheaper price. It's a great way to save on food whilst also ensuring none of it goes to waste. Some of the outlets on our University campuses (including SUSU outlets) are part of the TooGoodToGo scheme.



Local Supermarkets

Southampton and Winchester have a range of supermarkets that cater to all budgets and tastes. Here are some examples of popular supermarkets.



• Lidl and Aldi

Lidl and Aldi top the list as two of the most affordable places to do your weekly shop.

Asda, Tesco and Sainsbury's offer great discounts and vouchers. If you shop at Sainsbury's or Tesco regularly, you may want to sign up for ASDA rewards, a Nectar Card (Sainsbury's) or Clubcard (Tesco) to collect points and get discounts on some of their products.

• The Shop at SUSU (Highfield Campus)

Selling everything from food and drinks to stationary, <u>The Shop</u> is the place to visit when you're on campus and need something during the day or before you head home.

Waitrose and Marks & Spencer

Waitrose and Marks & Spencer are more upmarket options for food shopping. They have great quality products but are not the best choice if you are trying to save money on your food shop.

Highfield Campus

If you need to eat, drink or shop on Highfield campus, SUSU has got you covered! Aside from the <u>SUSU Shop</u>, our Union also has a popular pub (<u>The Stags</u>), a vegan restaurant (<u>Plant Pot</u>) and a bar and coffeeshop (<u>The Bridge</u>). Explore the options on our website <u>here</u>.

Portswood

Portswood is a suburb of Southampton and it is the area which is closest to Highfield Campus. <u>Portswood Road</u> is a great place for shopping, food and drink, and many of the establishments are student-focused. Restaurants include a range of international cuisines, and there are plenty of popular clubs and pubs to try.

Central Southampton and the Docks

Central Southampton has a host of eating and drinking options available. <u>Bedford</u> <u>Place</u> is an area with many outlets and night clubs and its nightlife is very popular with Southampton students. The <u>Westquay</u> Shopping Centre hosts a range of different dining options to enjoy in between or after shopping. Head further south to <u>Oxford Street</u> to find lots of independent business in Southampton. Southampton's <u>Ocean Village Marina</u> is also surrounded by shops, sophisticated bars, restaurants and a cinema.



Local Food, Drink and Nightlife - Winchester

Though Winchester is smaller than Southampton, it is home to many amazing eateries and pubs.

In Winchester, you'll find a range of dining choices, from traditional English pubs serving hearty local dishes to upscale restaurants offering diverse cuisines from different countries. The city's traditional pubs will give you a chance to try local ales and ciders.

Winchester's night scene is relatively laid-back, focusing more on intimate venues rather than big nightclubs, but here are some lively pubs with extended hours that offer live music, karaoke nights and DJs.

Independent Businesses

Winchester prides itself in having almost 200 independent businesses which include shops and restaurants, coffee shops, bars and galleries. <u>Winchester</u> <u>BID's Indie Map</u> can help you explore them when you're in town.
